
Behavioral Healthcare Workforce Shortage Impacting Crime Reduction Efforts

Illinois is suffering a behavioral healthcare (BHC) crisis as chronic workforce shortages collide with a sharp increase in demand. Experts estimate **nearly 8 million Illinoisans** (60%) live in mental health service shortage areas, and the current workforce is sufficient to meet only 24% of the need.

The Adult Redeploy Illinois state grant program is monitoring effects on ARI grantees -- drug courts, mental health courts, veterans courts, and specialized probation programs focused on rehabilitation and recidivism reduction.

A recent ARI site survey revealed the crisis' significant impact on local programs and client services.

Site Impact

- Sites are unable to fill staff positions for mental health and substance use disorder counseling required as a condition of court supervision, making it difficult for clients to succeed.
- Long wait times for behavioral health assessments to determine eligibility and service planning lead to bottlenecks in enrollment.
- Staffing shortages and capacity issues at residential treatment centers cause waitlists that delay client care and progress in the program.
- Provider staff turnover interrupts vital information sharing with court staff managing client supervision and services.

Client Impact

- Clients cannot access treatment at points critical to breaking the cycle of addiction and crime, which can put them at greater risk of overdose death.
- Clients often may receive inadequate or poor quality treatment from inexperienced counselors. Clients can struggle when only virtual options are available.
- High turnover rates create client barriers to building a therapeutic rapport with providers and can lead to higher rates of relapse or recidivism.
- An inability to meet client treatment needs can damage trust in the program, affecting client engagement, compliance, and long-term recovery.

Recommendations



Increase use of peer support models allowing individuals with lived experience to provide recovery coaching and mentoring to supplement treatment.



Promote statewide **tele-health and tele-psychiatry programs** to provide accessible and effective mental and behavioral healthcare services in rural and other hard-to-serve areas.



Work with local physicians and medical professionals to integrate mental health, behavioral health, and substance use disorder treatment into **primary healthcare settings**.



Provide funding to develop in-house capacity in probation departments utilizing individuals trained to conduct **behavioral health assessments** for more timely service planning and provision.



Invest in piloting and scaling mobile behavioral health service units and models. A circuit with 12 rural counties employs "roaming" counselors who meet clients in conveniently located offices.



Expand **crisis services** that provide individuals with stabilization and linkages to care. The Living Room program offers a safe space for individuals in crisis to connect with trained professionals.
